

## BACHELOR OF ARTS Political Science

### Program Description

The Bachelor of Arts in Political Science (BA PoS) Program is designed to provide college students with a foundation theoretical and fundamental methodological background in the study of politics, public governance, and law especially those who intend to proceed to law professional school and graduate studies in public management, development policy studies and related Social Sciences.

Through the synergy of coursework, research, and service-learning, the Program aims to educate future leaders in their chosen fields who will for sustainable development inspired by the practice of good governance, the spirit of peace and justice, the importance of inclusiveness and respect for human rights within the milieu of a democratic and people empowered society.

### Program Educational Objectives:

Within three to five years after obtaining a bachelor's degree in Political Science graduates are expected to:

1. Possessed the knowledge of the fundamental theories and principles, as well as the current issues and problems around the world and the ability to articulate the same in erudite discussions.
2. Contributed to the pool of knowledge related to the discipline through research and innovation in the fields of law, public management, development studies, and other related disciplines
3. Engaged in humanitarian works through public service or through NGOs or international organizations with sincerity, honesty and integrity
4. Demonstrated a strong sense of social responsibility in advancing advocacies related to the protection of human rights, caring for the environment and all of God's creations and the preservation of peace and the building of a just and humane global community.

### Program Outcomes

By the time of graduation, the students of the program shall have developed the ability to:

1. compare, contrast and classify the major concepts in the discipline by differentiating relevant from irrelevant information in various context
2. recognize and analyze the distinctiveness of the discipline, its subfields, theories and methods in a given situation in order to arrive at well-discerned decisions that have implications to self, family, society, environment and the Church
3. design and execute research inquiries using appropriate quantitative and qualitative methods guided by theories or conceptual frameworks and present such effectively and confidently in different settings and for various audiences
4. demonstrate written, visual and oral presentation skills to produce and present analytical reports using technology responsibly and skillfully in order to convey a message that is significant to society and the Church
5. critique, judge and respond to current issues and problems based on the substantive understanding of the historical and contemporary developments and take active role in the preservation, promotion and care of local, historical,

cultural heritage, and the environment and implement concrete action on societal and global concerns for the establishment of a more sustainable and humane global community

6. develop a predisposition towards ethical political involvement and practice in various forms and on different levels of engagement while establishing smooth interpersonal relationships with others with a desire to be a brother or a sister to all, especially to those in need.

### **Admission Requirements**

Students who intend to join the Program should:

1. Meet, and submitted all, the general requirement for admission to the University and that of the Department of Political Science;
2. Have passed or satisfied the standard set by the Department's Screening Committee such as written aptitude examination & panel interview;
3. Be a person of integrity and have no record of disciplinary or criminal cases involving crimes against person, property and moral turpitude;

### **Retention Policies**

To be retained in the Program, a Political Science major must:

1. Have a minimum grade of 83% in POSCI101 AND POSCI102;
  2. Pass and maintain a GPA of at least 83% in the professional courses;
  3. Not incur more than nine ( 9 ) units of failed or dropped mandated and general education courses during his/her entire stay in the Program;
  4. Be actively involved in the co-curricular activities sponsored by the Department and/or by the Political Science Society.

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**MAJOR COURSE DESCRIPTION BA**  
**Political Science**

**POSCI101** **3**  
**units**  
**FUNDAMENTALS OF POLITICAL**  
**SCIENCE**

The course is an introduction to the scope and methods of political science. It provides an understanding of the central concepts that deal with the nature of politics and the parameters of political analysis; the various theoretical and analytical frameworks and approaches with how politics is studied and how political understanding is acquired; the wide range of methodologies used in the systematic analysis of politics; as well as the core theoretical and methodological questions and issues in the discipline.

As a result, the students will have the skills in doing a critique of scholarly essays, articles, researches focusing on political approaches, perspectives, and methodologies in the form of a portfolio.

**POSCI102** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO PHILIPPINE**  
**POLITICS AND GOVERNANCE**

The course focuses on the discussion of the Philippine political structure and dynamics, involving institutions, personalities, controversies and ideas that constitute and define the current political landscape. The Philippine Constitution and applicable enabling laws and public policies serve as the bases for political analysis and investigations on numerous important topics such as policy making, electoral system, political party dynamics, interest groups and civil society, bureaucracy, politicization of the military, defense and the security sectors, and the local governments which all operate under the milieu of Philippine political culture.

As a result, the students will have the skills in crafting Thought Papers based on at least three research/case studies related or reflective of any of the above topics.

**POSCI103** **3 units**  
**ANCIENT AND MEDIEVAL**  
**POLITICAL THEORIES**

This course is an introduction to the subfield of political theory. It aims to examine how the political thinkers from Western antiquity to early modern era focusing on how their complex concepts, approaches and claims have structured the framing of contemporary debates on political issues. It gives opportunity to students to have basic but

critical understanding of various issues and controversies articulated by political thinkers and analysts today.

As a result, the students will have competence and skills in distinguishing variegated political theories, frame and problematize political issues and controversies, and engage in theorizing and conceptualizing political questions and policy challenges in the form of a Thought/Concept Paper.

**POSCI104** **3**  
**units**  
**MODERN POLITICAL**  
**THEORIES**

The course is a sequel to Ancient and Medieval Political Theories spanning several paradigms from classical realism, to liberalism, to critical realism, to structuralism, to critical theory, to post-modernism/post-structuralism that shape the complex, eclectic and multi-disciplinary view of the present global society.

As a result, the students will have the skills and competence in distinguishing and defining variegated political theories, and frame and problematize political issues in crafting a Thought/ Concept Paper on present persisting political phenomenon, internationally or locally that could be analyzed using a particular or several political theorists' ideas application.

**POSCI105** **3**  
**units**  
**PUBLIC SPEAKING AND**  
**DEBATE**

The course introduces the students to the art and techniques in public speaking that develops in the students the eloquence, clarity and correctness in verbal communication. It also requires the students to acquire knowledge and skills in the art of argumentation and debate which is essential in developing profound functional understanding of strategic political and critical social issues in society.

As a result, the students will have the skills in public speaking and debate as evidenced by their successful Speech and Public Speaking Competition or Presentation and engaging, and facilitative, Debate in intra-university and inter-university, or in sponsored by professional groups and institutions.

**POSCI106** **3**  
**units**  
**NEGRENSE**  
**STUDIES**

The course explores through multi-disciplinary investigations the political ecology of Negros sub-region by interrogating its historical, social, economic and cultural intersect that defines the present and continuing discourse of a Negrense society.

As a result, the students can formulate studies or activities expected, as evidenced

by successful activity or presentation in the form of play, theatre, forum, conference or congress; and/or a research paper that investigates certain facet of the 'Negrense.'

**POSCI107** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO**  
**COMPARATIVE**  
**POLITICS**

This course introduces the students to the basic concepts, theories and methodologies in Comparative Politics. It focuses on the study of the challenges to democratization and democratic

stability as well as the causes of civil conflict as it examines governmental institutions, public policy, political behavior and political culture of the countries studied.

As a result, the students acquire a strong theoretical framework in analyzing and evaluating on how political systems and power structures determine the success or failure of a political society through a well-researched work, policy paper and/or public forum.

**POSCI105** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO**  
**INTERNATIONAL**  
**RELATIONS**

This course provides students with an overview of the major theoretical approaches in IR—Realism, Liberalism, and Constructivism—and uses these frameworks to explain a variety of issues. The primary objectives of the course are to provide a basic understanding of IR Theories; to be familiar with key issues in international politics; and to better evaluate contemporary issues in world affairs..

As a result, the students will develop the ability to analyze key issues and identify the main sources of international conflict and become agents of peace through advocacy campaigns and joining in humanitarian works.

**SOCSCI101** **3**  
**units**  
**GENDER** **AND**  
**SOCIETY**

The course deals with studies on the role of women in development and the impact of development on women, the investigation of gender roles in society, and the ways on how to integrate gender concerns in policy development, program formulation, and implementation.

As a result, the students will have the competence and skills to critique gender issues vis-a-vis development challenges as well as formulate development programs that could enhance the conditions of women in society.

**POSCI110** **3 units**  
**POLITICAL PARTIES AND CIVIL**  
**SOCIETY**

The course is a research-oriented and Christian Service Learning Program (CSLP) design which focuses on the state-society nexus in the areas of political parties' dynamics, civil society interactions and social development outcomes. It exposes the students to the dynamics of social and political movements on the ground through community immersions, action research and people's advocacy

facilitation.

As a result, the students will have the skills in conducting service-learning programs and activities in the identified partner-communities, and competence in crafting modules on political education and social/community development strategies.

**POSCI111** **3 units**  
**AMERICAN GOVERNMENT AND**

**POLITICS** This course introduces the students on the historical beginnings, the constitution and agencies of the American political system and government that performs wide-ranging global security operations and economic development.

As a result of, the students will have the competence in articulating Philippine-US relations issues, and skills in developing programs and activities such as dialogues and forums that may lead to the understanding and clarification of the Philippines, the US and the wider global issues.

**POSCI112** **3 units**  
**POLITICS AND GOVERNANCE OF**  
**ASIAN STATES (focused on Southeast**  
**Asia)**

The course primordially applies comparative methodology vis-à-vis political theories in understanding varying political dynamics, contours and developments in Asia, particularly Southeast Asia. It equally underscores the roles of history, economy, social structure and systems that define the political systems of Asia. Likewise, it equips the students with the framework in understanding balance of power, Indo-Pacific equation, the rising Pax Sinica, globalizing conflict and trade relations.

As a result, the students will have the skills and competence in formulating research or concept paper on emerging or urgent Asian political issues or conduct/sponsor forums or conferences on similar issues.

**POSCI113** **3 units**  
**GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS OF**  
**SELECTED EUROPEAN STATES**

The course introduces the students to the comparative politics and government of selected European States with emphasis on shared history, political evolution, supra-national dynamics, inter-states and citizens relations, modernization and development, and shared continuing contemporary issues.

As a result, the students will have the skills and competence in formulating programs and activities that tackle Asia-Europe relation like Philippine- European Union Congress.

**POSCI114** **3**  
**units**  
**PHILIPPINE** **PUBLIC**  
**ADMINISTRATION**

The course deals with the identification and explication of the relevant theories, concepts and practices in the realm of Philippine public administration. It tackles

the workings of Philippine bureaucracy vis-à-vis the bureaucracies of other countries.

As a result, the students will have the competitive skills and tools in identifying problems in Philippine bureaucratic set-up as evidenced by their formulated action plans to address such issues using SWOT or Root Cause analysis of an identified government agencies or government programs.

**POSCI115** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO POLITICAL  
ANALYSIS AND RESEARCH**

The course introduces the students to theories and system of political analysis and the rudiments of political science research: conceptualization, framework formulation, critical literature review, design and methodological crafting, and instrumentation – the overall proposal development and formulation.

As a result, the students, as grouped, can formulate a research proposal and passed the scrutiny of a qualified panel during proposal presentation.

**POSCI116** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO POLITICAL  
ANALYSIS AND RESEARCH**

The course covers the execution of an accepted thesis proposal by a panel composed of three members accomplished through data collection based on political science methodological designs formulated and corresponding analytical frameworks.

As a result, the students will have competence and skills in conducting political science-oriented research as evidenced by their group thesis written report presented to the same panel members (who critiqued/approved their thesis proposal).

**POSCI118** **3 units**  
**PARLIAMENTARY RULES AND  
PROCEDURES**

The course introduces the students to the principles and practices of parliamentary rules and procedures observed or followed by organized deliberative organizations and societies such as legislative bodies, corporate entities, professional and civic organizations, and formally organized clubs. The course focuses on the application/ contextualization of the Robert's Rules of Order.

As a result, the students will acquire the skills and correct understanding in applying parliamentary rules in any deliberative social organizations and assemblies as shown in their performance during a Moot Parliamentary Assembly and educational tour to local Legislative Bodies such as Sanggunian Bayan, Sanggunian Panglunsod, or Sanggunian Panlalawigan Sessions.

**POSCI119** **3 units**  
**PHILIPPINE FOREIGN POLICY AND  
LAWS ON OVERSEAS FILIPINO  
WORKERS**

This course discusses the laws that provide the framework in the formulation of Philippine foreign policies with regards to the protection and the promotion of the

welfare of the Filipino migrant workers. The provisions of the 1987 Philippine Constitution related to this and the corresponding enabling laws such as RA 7157 or the Philippine Foreign Service Act Of 1991 and The Migrant Workers and Overseas Filipinos Act (RA 10022 which amended RA 8042) serve as the basis in the understanding of how the government deals with the challenges faced by the country's "modern day heroes".

At the end of the course, the students should be able to present a research paper on whether these laws really serve the purpose in which they were enacted vis-à-vis the experiences of the Filipino migrant and overseas workers.

**POSCI120 3 units**

**CONSULAR AND DIPLOMATIC**

**PRACTICES** The course introduces the students to the principles, methods and procedures involved in diplomatic and consular practices. It covers the evolution of diplomatic relations, contemporary diplomatic issues, the diplomatic protocols covered by the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations (1961) and Vienna Convention on Consular Relations (1963) and other Conventions, and Philippine Diplomatic Protocol define by the DFA Carlos P. Romulo School of Diplomacy.

As a result, the students can identify and evaluate diplomatic and consular issues through the conduct of forums, exposure trips, and acquire some etiquette through diplomatic dinner (fine dining).

**POSCI121 3 units**

**INTERNATIONAL POLITICAL**

**ECONOMY** International Political Economy (IPE) is a 3-unit course for students who are taking Political Science. It is part of the curriculum that provides a cursory discussion on the role of foreign governments and international institutions on the flow of production, distribution and consumption of a state's scarce resources. The discussion will lead to a deeper understanding on how domestic and international politics influence the economic relations between states and how trade relations, monetary exchange are played in the global arena.

At the end of the course, the students should present a research paper on contemporary issues affecting global economy and how these issues are addressed by countries with in their respective economic system.

**POSCI122 3 units**

**INTERNATIONAL AND REGIONAL ORGANIZATIONS**

The course introduces the students to the investigations of historical context, development, and roles of international, regional and supra- national organizations and institutions (with emphasis on the UN, NATO, EU, APEC, ASEAN, OPEC and other emerging regional groupings) in the shaping and trajectory of international order.

As a result, the students will acquire

people skills and social competence in dealing with different people (international civil servants and professionals) and cultural groups (exchange visitors) through participation and facilitation of forums, symposia and conferences.

**POSCI123** **3 units**  
**CURRENT ISSUES AND TRENDS IN**  
**INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS**

This course provides students with an overview of select discourses in Contemporary International Politics. It focuses on international actors, international institutions and systems that intersect with the issues of international politics, global economy and security.

As a result, the students will develop the competence in analyzing interconnecting issues and present paper through round table discussions, webinars, forum or conferences.

**POSCI124** **3**  
**units PUBLIC**  
**INTERNATIONAL LAW AND**  
**FOREIGN STUDIES**

The course provides a survey of the basic concepts of international law with particular emphasis on its conjunctions with global politics and its role in resolving international conflicts.

As a result, the students will have competence and skills in crafting position papers aimed at resolving international conflicts.

**POSCI116** **3**  
**units**  
**POLITICAL / LEGAL / INTERNATI**  
**ON AL / PUBLIC MANAGEMENT**  
**STUDIES INTERNSHIP**

The non-classroom-based course aims to expose the students, in an engaging fashion, to the experiential dynamics of public service organizations such as bureaucracy (line agencies, constitutional bodies, and governmental political institutions particularly Congress, consular and diplomatic offices), non-governmental organizations, professional-cum-civic service- oriented organizations, and international organizations/agencies.

As a result, after a 200-training hours, the students will have social competence and skills in human relations and acquire working knowledge as to the roles, functions and operations of their host organizations/agencies.

**POSCI126** **3 units**  
**PUBLIC HUMAN RESOURCE**  
**MANAGEMENT**

The course deals with the systems, ways and methods in managing and developing competence of public/government personnel, guided by Civil Service regulations on promotion, discipline and other pertinent policies governing public human resources.

As a result, the students will have competence and skills in formulating/crafting

HRD manuals appropriate to a particular public office/organization that was case studied.

**POSCI127** **3 units**  
**POLICY STUDIES AND**  
**PROGRAM FORMULATION**

The course covers principles, concepts, processes in public policy making and development and the strategies involved in formulating Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) defining and operationalizing the public policy formulated, as well as the execution, implementation and evaluation of policy-derived programs through appropriate methods and techniques.

As a result, the students will have the competence and skills in formulating and critiquing public policies enacted and crafted IRR operationalizing a given or identified public policy that was case studied.

**POSCI128** **3**  
**units**  
**PUBLIC FISCAL**  
**ADMINISTRATION**

The course deals with the organization, processes and procedures involved in fiscal administration, covering such areas as revenue generation, budgeting, accounting, auditing and inter-governmental fiscal regulations and management.

As a result, the students will have competence, skills and appreciation in analysing public finance issues by analysing statistical data obtained from PSA or Budget Office of a government agency and functional in handling work related to public finance derived from the knowledge of case studies conducted.

**POSCI130** **3 units**  
**POLICY DEVELOPMENT AND**  
**PROJECT MANAGEMENT**

This course deals with the principles and techniques in developing policies and translating them into government projects for public welfare.

As a result, the students will have competence in formulating policy-focused concepts which could be translated into development projects.

**POSCI131** **3**  
**units**  
**ORGANIZATION AND**  
**MANAGEMENT**

The course exposes the students to the understanding of the role of the managerial and leadership functions and systems in the establishment, development and managing of complex organizations in society.

As a result, the student will have

competence and skills in formulating management tools and systems in managing organizational enterprises as evidenced by a Manual of Operation for a particular case study made.

**POSCI132** **3**  
**units**  
**LOCAL GOVERNMENT**  
**ADMINISTRATION**

The course focuses on the administration of local governments (LGUs) in the areas of local-central relations, institutional development, and decentralization-federalism; as well as strategies of local governments in generating revenues and resources based on the provisions of the Local Government Code.



As a result, the students will have the competence and skills in formulating proposal and projects responsive to the LGU's agenda as well as the work and responsibilities associated with these formulated/conceptualized projects that resulted from educational trips and case studies required therefrom.

**PSLAW101** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO LAW AND FAMILY CODE**

The course provides the students with the integrated view of the legal system in the Philippines, and the basic principles of law and jurisprudence. It further introduces the students to the study of the Family Code with emphasis on marriage and family relations, the property regimes that govern spousal relations and the provisions on paternity and filiation.

As a result, the students will have competence to recognize the laws affecting family relationships and the processes available for resolving the legal aspects of family problems through participated/facilitated forums/discussions and case studies.

**PSLAW102** **3 units**  
**FUNDAMENTALS OF THE PHILIPPINE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM**

The course covers the principles governing criminal law in the Philippines. It provides a cursory discussion on the underlying philosophy of criminal law, classification of crimes and felonies as well as other provisions of the Revised Penal Code. It underscores the role of criminal justice system in the Lasallian mission to form citizens who will foster truth, justice and peace.

As a result, the students will acquire competence and skills in the documentation of significant cases of violation of the Revised Penal Code and analysis of the importance of an integrative participation of the five pillars of the criminal justice system in upholding peace and order in the community through case studies and/or symposiums.

**PSLAW103** **3 units**  
**LABOR AND SOCIAL LEGISLATIONS**

The course provides an introductory course in the study of P.D. 442 (Labor Code of the Philippines) with emphasis on the understanding of the importance of "social justice" by discussing the principles of labor standards, labor relations, and social legislations.

As a result, the students will acquire

competence and skills in applying the principles of Labor and Social legislation in evaluating every problems associated with labor law by coming up with symposium/forum on Labor issues/cases.

**PSLAW104** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO LAW ON OBLIGATIONS AND CONTRACTS**

The course focuses on the study of laws governing Obligations and Contracts – their kinds, nature and corresponding legal implications. It highlights the significance of every person's awareness of his rights, privileges, duties and responsibilities under various undertakings provided for by law.

As a result, the students will acquire correct knowledge, competence and skills in applying the legal concepts and governing rules to actual cases in the form of case studies/analysis.

**PSLAW105** **3 units**  
**INTRODUCTION TO CONSTITUTIONAL LAW WITH EMPHASIS ON THE BILL OF RIGHTS** The course introduces the students to the origin and principles of constitutional law and the doctrine of constitutionalism. It underscores the importance of constitutions especially in modern democratic political systems, and as a tool in upholding the workings of sovereignty necessary for the maintenance and durability of the democratic polity.

As a result, the students will acquire competence and skills in analysing constitutional issues and implications of the political system leadership policies and its consequential or resulting governance operation and implementation through case studies or by coming up with symposium/forum or attendance through conferences.

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
